The third match of our 2022 campaign saw us host Whitefriars College at BFL ground, Sebastopol. The SPC Main Oval is close to being finished and will be fit for matches in early Term 2. Whitefriars are part of the Associated Catholic Colleges (ACC) competition, which we have gained part membership of in 2022. This includes competing in Inter school Athletics and Swimming carnivals, as well as a number of performing arts/music competitions. Our great hope is that in 2023 we will be accepted as a full member school and be able to compete in senior football, cricket, basketball and soccer. This will provide significantly better competition for our senior boys. Having defeated fellow ACC school, St. Joseph's, Geelong, in the respect Cup, it was important to continue to make a statement against Whitefriars.

One of the main purposes of the Term 1 pre-season games is to provide as many opportunities as possible to boys in Years 10-12. It provides the coaches with a chance to see the boys play against quality opposition, before the BAS season commences in Term 2. With huge numbers on the training track, selecting sides has been difficult, hence the large number of changes from week to week. This fixture was no different with nine boys making their 1st XVIII debut. Across our first three matches forty nine boys have played a 1st XVIII match. The coaching staff will continue to make changes and rotate boys in upcoming matches against Assumption College, Wednesday March 30 at the City Oval and Geelong College on Tuesday, April 12 (venue to be confirmed).

The commitment, effort and enthusiasm of all boys who have played thus far has been superb. The coaching staff have been impressed with the willingness to accept team focused roles and rotating across different positions throughout games. Some of the pre-game focus points today were to win the contested ball, all contribute to the 1%er's, spread offensively by playing on and having a high number of handball receives and to all commit to team defence by manning up, pressing up when the ball is locked in our forward line and always having "defensive shape" behind the ball.

With the aide of a slight breeze the boys banged on four 1st quarter goals to one. The willingness to attack the contest with 100% effort enabled us to win the contested ball and then offensively spread with multiple options inboard and laterally. Kicking on 45 degree angles opened up the play and ensured quick entries inside 50. All our forwards were dangerous with Ash Cutts and Max Filmer hitting the scoreboard. Joe Fraser and Hamish Thompson were swapping from the ruck to deep forward. Both provided a target when presenting and sat a kick behind the play when in the ruck, a true understanding of playing their role.

The 2nd and 3rd quarters were quite even with Whitefriars lifting their intensity. With game ending injuries to Jarrod White and Ed Turner our rotations were limited off the bench. The game had

dropped in pace as players fatigued, with more stoppages occurring and slow forward entries. Despite this match trend, we wasted some opportunities in the third quarter by just kicking the ball down the line or long to centre half forward.

At $\frac{3}{4}$ time the message was to run and carry, increase our handball receives, use the corridor and really pressure the opposition and force them back to create turnovers. With some positional changes being made Ted O'Brien kicked an early goal and we got the game back on our terms. Ollie Hannaford took a number of telling marks across half back, Sam Lalor continued to impact the contest and brought teammates into the game by hand and foot and Harry Lawson provided both grunt and dash to win plenty of telling possessions. The group's willingness to listen to instruction and execute our pre-match plans enabled us to run out 29 point winners. The game was played in great spirit and we welcomed Whitefriars back to the college for a pasta meal before they made the trek home.

Our fourth pre-season game saw us up against traditional and long-standing rival, Assumption College. It was SPC's turn to host this year and we were lucky to be able to play on another quality BFL ground, the City Oval. More boys were rewarded with a debut game, these being Declan Kelly, Gus Toll, Mason Gullick and Chase Scoble. This continues the theme of giving as many boys as possible an opportunity to impress in the pre-season fixtures. The total number boys who have played at least one of the four preseason games totals 52, this number of opportunities is unprecedented. It must be noted that our 16 NAB listed boys have all played just the one match and we have had unavailabilities due to BAS Cricket, Outdoor Education camps and illness.

Other than a bit of wind, the conditions were quite good for football at City Oval today and Assumption were able to get the upper hand early after punishing some poor turnovers from SPC and putting on 3 goals to none in the first term. Assumption had the ascendancy at stoppages and were moving the ball well from the HB line and St Pats didn't have many answers early.

SPC were their own worst enemies in the first half turning the football over on many occasions which made it difficult to get any momentum in the game. At half time being unable to register a goal the boys were asked to be harder in the contest and concentrate on the basics to try and get back in the game.

The second half was a much better showing from the SPC boys but they were still no match for a very strong Assumption side. Max Faulkner and Harry Lawson fought really hard throughout the day to try and get their side back in it. Harvey Driscoll had plenty of work to do in defence but did well under trying circumstances.

Overall it was a disappointing loss but one that shows some of the inexperienced players the level in which they need to get to in order to play consistent 1st XVIII football.

Our final pre-season match is against APS school, Geelong College, on Tuesday, April 12, which is in the first week of the holidays. It would be great to see as many supporters as possible to witness the first football match on the newly re-developed Main Oval.

Soccer verse Whitefriars College

ST PATRICK'S COLLEGE SENIOR SOCCER REPORT

St Patricks' College Senior Soccer played their first match against Whitefriars College as a friendly gesture from an ACC team, the competition which St Patrick's are hoping to be entered into next year.

The first 20 minutes was notable for a total no show from the Ballarat boys as the Donvale team gained 0-1 on an early foul inside the box for a first goal, 0-2 after a poorly defended front of goal (probably due to an injury to one of our backmen), and 0-3 to a prepared build up by Whitefriars in a signature cross pass in front of goal and deliberate drive giving our keeper no chance. The question on the observers' minds was that this may be a total mismatch and that Whitefriars speed was just too hot for us to handle. An alternative consideration was that the coach had completely misread the abilities and team placements of his players, because some of the big names seemed hopelessly out of touch.

We made 4 changes after this early assault had put us back towards our defensive mind set, with just hope on our side. Somehow, hope arose slowly at first, but it gathered momentum – soon blossoming into real intent. The most diminutive spark appeared in the person of Harry Broadbent (just off the flight from London) who was one of the fillips that started our resurgence. He was holding the ball through the centre, which we had struggled to do with any intent. Also, Ngor Bar was winning his position off left back clearly, despite passing centrally into danger on a number of occasions. However, he was clearly outpointing his opponent and turning their advances. Nicholas Hontzogloy who was very busy in the centre was joined by his brother Manny playing on the left wing and we started to win balls clearly across the centre.

Harry set up our first score through a determined long run past a number of our opponents down the right side, running deep to the line and passing back into the 18 yard box with Sam Litras finding a ball squeezed out from a contested scramble and he duly drove it into the back of the net 1-3. Connor Nelson-Higgins took control on the right wing and centred into the box for Sam Litras again, but he hit the ball high. Manny ran deep and looked dangerous into our forward line, but their defensive line turned the attack. Gabe Thompson-Newbury went forward and a one two via Manny drew a good defence from their keeper.

Their defender used a shoulder as a wall but were penalised close to half time. We had two on the shot, but Connor Nelson-Higgins was the designated hitter, and his shot stunned the keeper with a high shot into the left of his goals for us to have appeased the score back to 2-3 by half time. Lachlan Hodge who was a late replacement in goals, showed his worth with a terrific save very late in the half. Lachlan in holding the score close to Whitefriars was instrumental in what happened after the break.

Ngor Bar continued to be in control at the start of the second half from his left defensive position and threatened to score in one foray. However, changes had to be made and others given a chance to show their skills. Brodie Willems and Oscar Cherry slotted into the backline and both showed determination and skill in their roles. Manny gained a ball on the left side and he smashed a ball over 30 metres into the goals with a powerful strike.

Up forward Rex Van Berkel was causing concerns to Whitefriars and he received from Connor Nelson-Higgins and turned smartly and shot high and it was only a brave save from their keeper that kept it out. Sam Litras continued to confuse their defence with his pace and his smart movement to the right gave Chan Bar a sighter and despite keeper and defender facing him, Chan slotted through a beautiful goal to allow us to take the lead 4-3.

They pulled one back from a deep incursion from their right and Lachie tried to save with a definite dive to his left but their striker was on target to level the scores.

The referee was called to make a decision on the next goal which Sam Litras gained via an opportune deflection off a defender giving Sam time inside the 18 yards for 5-4. They attacked but couldn't break our strong defence of Gabe Thompson-Newbury and Brodie Willems with Sam Clark becoming stronger and more sure the further the game went on. Sam's clearing headers

became a feature of our better defensive structure and Lachlan Hodge proved his worth with sure handed collects from their high ball attacks on our goals.

Daniel Weigall who was given a forward birth showed his multi skills with some sharp play up front. He was dogged in his run past a number of defenders deep in their defence and up against the line, before turning back inside and slotting an excellent goal for 6-4. And finally, Connor showed his skills, now firmly owning the central position in the centre alongside Nicholas, by taking on numerous opponents and playing deep, before centering for Manny to put the final nail in the coffin for a 7-4 great result for St Patrick's.
