It appears that Rhys hit his head when he fell to the ground and is now in an induced coma in Melbourne in a critical but stable condition. We can hardly start to imagine the concern and anxiety and questioning of both young men's families and friends. I find myself only left to pray for their mutual wellbeing and recovery.

Last Friday Mrs Kristine Smardon and Mrs Maree Moore had the privilege of accompanying ten fine young members of the St Patrick's College St Vincent de Paul Group to the annual Young St Vinnies Conference held at Sacred Heart Girls' College in Oakleigh. It is so invigorating to spend a day with young people who are volunteering to give of their time and effort to help others.

Throughout the day I was particularly drawn to a text by John Honner. John proposes that his intent when writing *'Love and Politics'* was to:

"explore the significance of Ozanam's ideas (founder of St Vinnies) for Christians involved in working for justice or working in politics in liberal democracies today, where we face new challenges about culture, economics, welfare, charity and political values."

Ozanam's lasting legacy is the inspiration his life and writings give us. Unlike many saints he was not an ascetic. He did not live an extraordinarily different life. He was both a hard worker and a loving husband who was moved by the example of Jesus, by a sense of human community, by the misery of the poor, of his time and by love for his neighbour. Ozanam sacrificed his academic dreams and his health to bring them care and justice.

We cannot expect politicians to be like him, we can hardly expect to be like him ourselves, but we can expect Ozanam to be a model for us to our engagement with politics. In this way, love and injustice can be drawn together.

Ozanam's only unwavering commitment was to love. In July 1834 Frederic wrote, "If you want a formula here it is: I believe in authority as a means, in liberty as a means and in love as the end."

St Patrick's College defeated Box Hill Secondary College by 89 points in the second round of the MCC Herald Sun Shield.

Played in blustery conditions at St Patrick's College, St Pat's in a commanding performance set up the game in the first half, holding a 38 point lead at the main break.

Although conceding height, Hayden Walters provided great drive from the ruck division and his work with Jordan Alexander in particular was outstanding. Edward Arthurson continues to be influential off his wing and his run and carry of the football is a contributing factor why St Patrick's College had fifteen inside 50 marks for the duration of the game.

Nick O'Brien was outstanding throughout the match and kicked eight goals in a Best on Ground performance. Nick's aerial dominance was a highlight and although at times Box Hill had pushed extra numbers behind the ball, his aggressive leading, combined with his sure hands negated this tactic. Nick was ably supported by Matt James and Jake Dunne who between them kicked five clinical goals. The spread of goal kickers highlighted the efficient manner that the ball entered the forward 50 throughout the match.

A telling statistic that summed up the dominance of St Patrick's College was the amount of inside 50's between both sides throughout the match. St Patrick's College had 47 inside entries into the forward 50 compared to just 21 from Box Hill. An even more telling statistic was after quarter time, Box Hill only entered their forward 50 on eleven occasions and this was a direct result of the pressure from both the midfield and defensive groups.

Pat Britt continues to have a superb season and his work at the main central post of Full Back is exceptional. His closing speed and his core strength are real assets to his game and once again, his drive until he was injured late in the third quarter was instrumental in setting the game up for us. Another player who was instrumental in the win was Ben Peters. Ben played in the key defensive post at Centre Half Back and until Ben was rested late in the third quarter, for mine, he was the most influential player on the ground. His hands were extremely clean, his disposal by either foot or hand was precise and his combined leadership with Robbie Lockett ensured that there would be no let down following the important win the previous week against PEGS.

One area that we weren't as effective as we have been in previous weeks was our 1% measurements. We had a total of 71 1% acts for the day, down by 20 from the previous week. Although this was probably due to a variety of contributing factors, namely the quality of this week's opposition, our ability to control the game and our inability to play with the same intensity from the previous week, it is an area that we pride ourselves on and if we are to compete successfully at both the MCC Herald Sun Shield and BAS levels we need to adopt the same mindset as we approached the PEGS game.

It is extremely important that we do not get ahead of ourselves and think that we are already at the Semi Final Stage of the Competition. Not only do we need to defeat Bendigo Secondary College on Wednesday June 18 however we need to re-commit to our BAS campaign starting with Ballarat Clarendon College next week. It is extremely important that the standard and style of football that has been played over the last five weeks is maintained as winning, breeds a winning culture.


