**City of Ballarat 'School Immunisation Programme'**

On the morning of Monday August 25 staff from the City of Ballarat's Schools Immunisation programme will return to the College for the second round of Hepatitis B injections for boys in Year 7 and to catch up with a small number of boys in Years 7 and 10 who missed the first set of immunisations earlier in the year. The immunisations will be administered in the Board Room via qualified staff and under the supervision of College staff. No additional consent or medical forms are required for this second set of injections.

If any boy who is due to receive his second injection on this date is unable to attend, the City Council advises that these can be taken at clinics being run at Eastwood Leisure Centre on September 3 and 17 from 4:00 – 5:00pm. The Council is also able to conduct immunisations at The Phoenix Building (25 Armstrong Street South) by appointment only.

### **'A Fountain of Living Water in the Midst of a Thirsty World'. World Youth Day Message**

The best homily I have ever heard?

When a person responds to the Word of God at a public gathering the impact can be momentous, life changing, grace engaging and faith strengthening. Years later some people assert that the sermon at the funeral, celebration or event was truly remarkable.

My brother-in-law stated that at the funeral of his teenage son the homilist reminded the mourners that the Our Father has a key component in the line: *thy will be done*.

Strangely in God's unpredictable way this sombre statement offered a sense of assurance to the family. Not dampening their struggling spirits this reminder became a Word of God that engendered peace and acceptance. The impact of the homily at that time continues to reverberate in the lives of the family today as they ponder the mystery of a son's battle with leukaemia and as they move forward in life.

The recent trip to Sydney for World Youth Day offered the pilgrims the opportunity to hear live the sermon of our Pope at a grand event. I am not sure which homilies are in my top five but this one has to be amongst the best.

What impressed me was his breadth of knowledge and the ease with which he can glide through the scriptures, Fathers of the Church and recent conciliar and papal pronouncements. The Pontiff is not looking for new angles for he knows that the novel is short-lived and generally erroneous. At this Mass he offered an inspiring sermon that riveted me with its poetry, simplicity and optimistic ring.

The homily of Benedict XVI to the young people of the world focussed upon the power of the Holy Spirit. He reminded them that as confirmed Christians they have entered a "new upper room" wherein the Spirit has descended upon them offering transformation and making them new. This Holy Spirit has the power to raise Jesus from the dead. This divine energy binds us to one another and opens us to see God's amazing grace in the wonder of creation. This Person of God flows deep within us like an underground river. Echoing his encyclical on God's Love he urged the youth of the world to "be a fountain of living water in the midst of a thirsty world". The tone of the homily was encouraging and hopeful, expecting a positive response.

The Pope was also preaching to the world in this sermon. He reminded us that we have a gift of faith that missionaries and teachers, parents and grandparents treasure.

"What will you leave to the next generation?" he asked.

His request, which could have been a command, was to live life. Open up a space for the Holy Spirit in your life and use the gifts you have been given. If you do this you are releasing the power of this river and showing others the way ahead. The power of the Spirit enlightens us and conforms us, creating a new world and a new generation of Christians. The power of the Spirit relieves us of apathy and makes us

prophets of this new age enabling us to build a future of hope. For people who live lives that are empty cisterns searching for meaning we can offer living water, enabling them to find fulfilment in love. This Spirit will refresh them. In order to do this we must revive the grace of our own confirmation.

The homily was so optimistic, so confident, so encouraging. It was certainly one of the best I have heard and revitalised my commitment to the call. Living out the command to be living water within our community is the challenge.

### Parenting Tips

#### The Top 10 Ways to Raise Emotionally Intelligent Kids

Having a high level of emotional intelligence in your children is the best way to ensure that they live a happy, successful, and responsible life as an adult. Here are ten ways to help your kids attain a high degree of emotional intelligence:

##### 1. Model emotional intelligence yourself.

Yes, your kids are watching very closely. They see how you respond to frustration, they see how resilient you are, and they see whether you're aware of your own feelings and the feelings of others.

##### 2. Be willing to say "no" to your kids.

There's a lot of stuff out there for kids. And your kids will ask for a lot of it. Saying no will give your kids an opportunity to deal with disappointment and to learn impulse control. To a certain degree, your job as a parent is to allow your kids to be frustrated and to work through it. Kids who always get what they want typically aren't very happy.

##### 3. Be aware of your parental "hotspots."

Know what your issues are - what makes you come unglued and what's this really about? Is it not being in control? Not being respected? Underneath these issues lies a fear about something. Get to know what your fear is so you're less likely to come unglued when you're with your kids. This doesn't make fears go away, it just makes it easier to plan for and to deal with.

##### 4. Practice and hone your skills at being non-judgmental.

Start labelling feelings and avoid name-calling. Say, "he seems angry," rather than, "what a jerk." When your kids are whiny, saying things like, "you seem sad," is better than just asking them to stop. Depriving kids of the feelings they're experiencing will only drive them underground and make the feelings stronger.

##### 5. Start coaching your kids.

When kids are beyond the toddler years, you can start coaching them to help them to be more responsible. Instead of "get your hat and gloves," ask, "what do you need to be ready for school?" Constantly telling your kids what to do does not help them to develop confidence and responsibility.

##### 6. Always be willing to be part of the problem.

See yourself as having something to do with every problem that comes along. Most problems in families get bigger when parents respond to them in a way that exacerbates the problem. If your child makes a mistake, remember how crucial it is for you to have a calm, reasoned response.

##### 7. Get your kids involved in household duties at an early age.

Research suggests that kids who are involved in household chores from an early age tend to be happier and more successful. Why? From an early age, they're made to feel they are an important part of the family. Kids want to belong and to feel like they're valuable.

##### 8. Limit your kids' access to mass media mania.

Young kids need to play, not spend time in front of a screen. To develop creativity and problem-solving skills, allow your kids time to use free play. Much of the mass media market can teach your kids about consumerism, sarcasm, and violence. What your kids learn from you and from free play with others will provide the seeds for future emotional intelligence.

**9. Talk about feelings as a family.**

State your emotional goals as a family. These might be no yelling, no name-calling, be respectful at all times, etc. Families that talk about their goals are more likely to be aware of them and to achieve them. As the parent, you then have to "walk the talk."

**10. See your kids as wonderful and capable.**

There is no greater way to create emotional intelligence in your child than to see them as wonderful and capable. One law of the universe is, "what you think about expands." If you see your child as wonderful, you'll get a lot of "wonderful." If you think about your child as a problem, you'll get a lot of problems.

On Tuesday July 29 the first Information Evening of the 2009 Cricket Tour of the United Kingdom and Singapore was conducted. There has been keen interest in the tour which is open to students specifically from Year 8 to Year 11.

For those who were unable to attend the information evening on July 29, please find below a detailed summary of the information that was presented in order to aid families in the decision making process.

- The tour will be conducted during the three week term break between June 20 and July 11 2009.
- There will around 12 fixtures in Scotland, Yorkshire, Midlands, Surrey and one fixture on return to Australia via Singapore.
- It should be noted that 16 students is the optimum number for the trip to proceed. In line with the educational objectives of the tour should the number of applications exceed the number of places available on the tour the Tour Selection Committee (Damian McKee, Chris Gleeson and Mark Waddington) will decide on the members of the touring team.

- All students selected will have demonstrated a record of participation within the College's cricket programme from Year 7 to 11.
- The tour is a part of the 1st XI cricket programme. In line with this the Committee will select its best team to represent the College in the future, provided that players considered for selection are making sound academic progress and do not have a behavioural record that could suggest they may not represent the College in the manner expected of St Patrick's College students.
- It is estimated that the cost of the tour will be \$5,000. The final cost will be notified following the announcement of the squad.
- An 'expression of interest' payment of \$500 will be due on August 29. \$50 of this payment will be non-refundable on the selection of the touring team.
- The first official instalment of \$500 is to be paid on Friday November 28. Please refer to the instalment conditions. \$1,000 instalments will be due on January 30, February 27, April 24, and May 29.
- To assist families in the cost of the tour the College will compile a sponsorship package for families to present to a local business. The package will provide a scale of sponsorship and the benefits for the business.

On Saturday August 19, Xavier College in Kew played host to the 2008 Grand Finals of the Victorian Schools Rugby Union competition. In a feast of School Rugby, nine grand finals were contested on the playing fields at Xavier College, in almost perfect conditions.

**Seniors**  
In a game that had everything, St Patrick's came home with the VSRU 1st XV Division II crown with a desperate 15-12 victory against arch rival Ivanhoe Grammar. With the home and away games resulting in a win each during the regular season, the stage was set for a fantastic contest and neither team let their supporters down.

From the kick-off it soon became clear that St Patrick's were well prepared to give the ball to their backline and let them run at the Ivanhoe defence. Fly half Ethan Clarken, returning from a four week injury layoff, was prominent early with punishing running and intelligent kicking. Damien Farrell was also damaging, repeatedly probing the Ivanhoe defence with hard running. With the ball moving quickly by hand, St Patrick's were rewarded for their efforts early when Richie Bauer crossed out wide for the first score of the game. With a taste for the contest, St Patrick's launched offensive attacks time after time to press home the advantage and were unlucky not to have scored on a couple of more occasions.

To Ivanhoe's credit their defence held firm and they used the size and strength of their forward pack to move the ball to their own advantage, crossing for a try themselves. St Patrick's were defending their line desperately and suffered a setback when Steve Yaakoob was yellow-carded. Soon after Ivanhoe earned a penalty and chose to kick for goal. In what would later prove decisive, the penalty conversion was unsuccessful and half time saw the score locked at 5 - 5.

The second half was played at the same frenetic pace as the first, with both teams seeking to break the contest open. Heavy work by both forward packs was mixed with exciting moves from the backs when the ball was thrown wide. Desperate defence from both teams saw attacking moves stopped close to the line before a break-out move by Ethan Clarken. With support out wide from Damien Farrell and Richie

Bauer, Ethan ran hard and straight, brushed off a couple of defenders and scored under the posts. He followed this with the conversion to put St Patrick's ahead by 7 points. Ivanhoe lifted as they pressed for the equaliser and were rewarded when they crossed for a try and successfully converted to tie the game up once again at 12 - 12.

With time fast running out the intensity and tension went to a new level as both teams sought the final advantage. The physical toll on both teams was starting to show with many players physically spent from their efforts, perhaps more so for the Ivanhoe forward pack. In what proved to be the final play of the day, St Patrick's were awarded a penalty within range of the goal. As Ethan Clarken stepped up to take the kick on goal a complete silence descended over the field as supporters of both teams held their breath. It had all come down to this final kick. As the ball sailed through for a successful conversion, and the referee signalled time, jubilation erupted in the ranks of the St Pat's team and their supporters.

In a fantastic team effort all players contributed to the victory. Ethan Clarken was a dominant player at fly half and Ben Jenkins once again marshalled his troops with great skill from scrum half. Damien Farrell never stopped running out wide, while the forward pack was well served by Bert Thompson, Digby Gram and Steve Yaakoob.

First XV coach Mr Graham Swinton was proud and relieved after the game, declaring that it was the St Patrick's heart that carried them to victory and that every player on the team could be proud of their contribution to the win.

The victory gave St Patrick's its first regular season rugby trophy since re-commencing the Rugby programme in 2004. For the Year 12 members of the team it was a fitting end to their rugby time at St Pat's. Many had played in the team which narrowly lost the corresponding match in 2007, so to be part of this historic victory is just reward for the effort of all those involved.

#### **Under 16s**

In the Under 16 Division II, St Patrick's finished its season in fine style with a 34-21 win over Ivanhoe Grammar at Ivanhoe on Saturday. Played in fine but cool conditions, the game was a feast of running rugby with both teams prepared to throw the ball to their respective backlines in an attempt to open up the opposition lines.

St Patrick's were dominant in the first half, taking a 22-7 lead into half time. Tim Jenkins at scrum half was creative with his passing, while Max Hughes used kick and chase plays to great effect to create opportunities for the running backline. St Patrick's were tackling strongly forcing many turn-overs from the Ivanhoe team. Alex McPherson, Jake Hutchison, Jack Williams and Justin King all crossed for tries. St Patrick's bench depth was sorely tested with injuries to Regan Boyce (ankle) and Jake Hutchison (knee) seeing them both out of the game before half time.

The second half opened up completely with the ball moving rapidly from one end of the field to the other, and both teams being stopped just short of the try line on numerous occasions. Ivanhoe were relentless in their attack as they sought to expose St Pat's injury problems. Under 14 player Jack Jenkins, a spectator at the game, soon found himself on the field and throwing himself into the contest with an enthusiasm that belied his size. With a bye in round 8, SPC students competed in the annual BAS v Geelong combined representative match. Below is an account of the match from Captain Austin Murphy.

On August 6, the Ballarat Associated Schools combined soccer team played against a team made up of players from schools in the Geelong region. SPC was the most represented school with eight players being a part of the team.

The game started off at a frenetic pace, with Geelong dominating early, whilst steady defending from David King and Angus Martin (SPC) kept Geelong temporarily at bay. However on eleven minutes, a long ball from a Geelong player caused confusion at the back and resulted in an opposing attacker lobbing the ball over Anthony Cocomazzo in the goals to make it 1-0.

The team looked to rebound quickly, but the confidence of the team was waning slightly. Two minutes later Geelong came up with an accidental goal, when one of their players attempted clearance that managed to trouble Cocomazzo and catch him off his line and fall into the net to push Geelong out to a 2-0. Of the BAS players, Kyran Taylor (SPC) and Jan Posch (BHS) were very good in the middle of the park. Marcus Lynch and Jacob Krusche (SPC) also played their position to an exceptional standard. BAS managed to regain momentum and create some chances up forward, whilst limiting damage in the back and play the better soccer of the half.
