One of the attitudes to learning that these boys share is a recognition that the time and effort a student puts into his studies today is forwarded to him at a later date. Maximising class time, completing all set tasks, seeking assistance, completing additional or extension tasks, not delaying the completion of tasks (including homework), being organised and wanting to show your teacher just what you can do are all examples of the types of activities and strategies that students benefit from in the future – be it the next class, the next assessment task, the end of semester exam or work completed in the next year.

The message from these boys is clear - do the work now and you will enjoy the rewards of your efforts in time to come. Congratulations to each of these boys, their results clearly show the benefits of these learning strategies.

Our final Headmaster's excellence Award for 2012 was presented to Year 9 student, **Nicholas Frawley**, in recognition of the consistently high standard of his work in English throughout the year. Nick averaged 93% for all assessment tasks completed in Year 9 English this year – a level of success definitely worth acknowledging. Nick's success is characterised by diligent work, thorough planning and actively seeking extra help when needed.

Nick spoke to me about the importance he places on fully understanding the topic or concept he is writing about before beginning the writing process. Spending time researching facts and figures, finding relevant quotes and understanding what the experts have to say about a topic all help to make Nick's writing more engaging for the reader.

Like so many other boys who experience success in English, Nick reads widely and uses the knowledge he gains from this to build and expand his vocabulary – an aspect that is a clear strength of his writing. As Nick told me, reading widely helps you to see how words can be used in a variety of contexts and situations which, in turn, builds your capacity to use them in your own writing. Well done, Nick, on a great year of work in English.

Congratulations to each boy who received either a Headmaster's Excellence or Academic Endeavour Award in 2012. I have thoroughly enjoyed looking at, and hearing about, the great work you each did and I am grateful for your willingness to share the strategies that have helped you be academically successful with all boys at the College.

Use of the Parent Access Module for end of semester reports

In June and September you received letters outlining the introduction of the Parent Access Module (PAM) which provides parents online access to a range of information specific to your son. Currently, you are able to view your son's timetable, his attendance records, daily messages, the College calendar and your son's Interim and End of Semester reports for both the current and previous years.

With the Student Assessment section now open, and having successfully trialled its use to deliver the 2012 Term Three Interim Reports, the College will be extending our use of PAM to include online delivery of End of Semester reports.

While we are asking you to use PAM to access your all of your son's reports instead of the College printing and mailing a paper copy to you, we recognise that some parents will still require or want a paper copy. Parents who want to receive a paper copy of the reports are asked to phone the College on 5331 1688 before Friday, December 7 to confirm this. Parents who previously indicated they wish to receive a paper copy of reports do not need to contact the College again.

The 2012 Semester Two reports for Years 7-11 students will be accessible via PAM from 4.00pm on Friday, December 14. Parents requiring further assistance with their PAM login are asked to phone the College on 5331 1688. A copy of the *Parent User Guide* for PAM has been placed on the College webpage. The College is also in the process of creating a PAM login for non-custodial parents which will be mailed as soon as possible.

The purpose of this photograph was to indicate our support for the White Ribbon campaign which highlights the often hidden part of society which is Domestic Violence. All in all, there has been a lot of celebrating lately! It is good for us to do this as a community and gives us all great heart that as a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition, we are making great progress with our boys as they make their way towards being young men.

Exams

Currently all boys are either completing their end of year exams, or preparing for them. These exams are another important method of assessment and it is important that the boys approach them seriously and work hard to achieve the best set of results via these in each subject. I would like to stress to all boys the importance of talking with their individual teachers about the content and structure of the exams – they should not leave anything to chance! I encouraged the boys to find out as much about the exam from their teachers and begin their preparation based on this information.

Successful revision or study requires many different ingredients – one of the key elements that I wish to touch on briefly this week is the importance of sleep! Regardless of normal routines it is absolutely vital that our young men get regular sleep.

Do you know how much sleep the average teenager requires according to the very latest research?

The actual research shows they require a minimum of 9.25 hours and that one of the biggest problems is that we have teenagers being the most sleep deprived segment of the population. We need to take the whole issue of sleep as one of the most important issues, when it comes to setting boundaries we need to fight over things that matter and that's generally stuff that relates to their wellbeing.

In the context of completing exams successfully, it is absolutely important that our boys are fresh and alert when they sit for them. Regular sleep without the distractions of mobile phones, i-pods or MP3 players, TVs or computers is essential for academic success and for the well-being of our boys!

Seven Must Knows About Boys

No. 1: You must like them

Take the time to nurture a relationship with your sons or the boys that you interact with. Some boys like to talk; others like to share an activity; some like you as an adult to do something for them; others are very kinaesthetic and love to be touched, cuddled and hugged; while some just love gifts and mementoes. Work out the relational preferences of the males in your life.

No. 2: Most boys just want to blend in

Boys are group-oriented by nature. They want to fit in. They tend to play group games and form themselves into structured friendship groups. Boys generally don't want to stand out from their crowd.

No. 3: They are hierarchical and they like to know who is in charge

Boys like limits and boundaries as they make them feel safe and secure. They also like to know that someone is going to enforce those rules so don't be afraid to be 'in charge'.

No. 4: Many boys hide behind a mask

Some boys, eight years of age and older, wear a mask to protect themselves from being hurt or to portray a tough guy image. They will attempt to communicate with that mask. Refuse to communicate with a mask. Make them feel comfortable, joke with them, even tickle them but get them to drop the mask if you really want to get through to them.

No. 5: Loyalty is an incredibly strong driver for boys

Understand that a boy's loyalty to friends, family, teachers and cause are key male drivers and you go a long way to understanding the male psyche. They are incredibly influenced by their peers, which can hold many of them back. It takes a brave boy to get too far ahead of the pack so they often hold each other back when it comes to achieving.

No. 6: Use short-term goals to motivate them

Want to know how to motivate a boy to learn? Just make sure he can see some type of benefit in the task he will work hard to get it. You need to make sure the benefit is tangible and the gain is foreseeable.

No. 7: A boy's brain matures differently than a girl's brain

In the first five years of life a boy's brain is busy developing gross motor skills, spatial skills and visual skills. So boys often start school with a distinct disadvantage when it comes to learning and fitting in.

- When the new 2013 booklists are received, list 'Wanted' and 'For Sale' ads, parents tell each other their requirements.
- The school's booklists are loaded into the system to make listing ads easy.
- The system matches the ads of buyers with sellers and notifies the buyer (Wanted ad) via email.
- Buyers contact sellers and arrange where and when to trade.
- Most trading will occur with other parents from the school.
- Parents are well supported with telephone (1300 683 337) and email help lines.
- Over a little time you will see which parents have the most books you need.

The service provides access to second-hand textbooks, calculators, stationery, musical equipment, etc all year round. Parents can even trade with other parents from different schools and sell textbooks no longer in use at St Patrick's.

'No one can say "I have the truth". It is the truth that possesses us.'

This was the message of Pope Benedict in a homily offered on September 2 this year. His claim is at once immediate in our experiences and rejected by many. However, to speak of 'moral laws' in a modern pluralist culture is to raise the ire of some people. But when a staff member contemplates the gift of their students, or a parent their child, they are possessed by a desire to only do what is best for them.

That desire is the law of God's love written on our hearts that enables us to respond **wisely**. Pope Benedict continues...

In Deuteronomy we see the 'joy of the law': law not seen as a constraint, as something that takes from us our freedom, but as present and a gift... [The people of Israel] know: this 'law' was not made by them, it was not the fruit of their genius, it was a gift. God showed them what the law was. God gave them wisdom. The law is wisdom. Wisdom is the art of being human, the art of being able to live well and of being able to die well. And one can live and die well only when the truth has been received and shows us the way: to be grateful for the gift we did not invent, but that we were given, and to live in wisdom; to learn, thanks to the gift of God, how to be human in the right way.

Dear Parents/Guardians and Pupils (present, past and new)

Well, the year is almost over. I am sure I am not the only one breathing a sigh of relief, as the past few months have been a tiring time for all, culminating in the exam period and a busy end of year all round.

I would like to take this opportunity once again to bid our 23 Year 12 leavers the very best of luck for the future. Whether that be in the AFL, at university or along the myriad other pathways individuals are choosing to follow, I thank them again for all they have given to the boarding community over the years and hope that we see them back for a visit now and again and at Old Collegian events.

In 2013 we look forward to welcoming a good number of new boys from close by and far afield. We have boys joining us from Year 9 through to Year 12. I know all our seasoned boarders will do all they can to settle them in quickly and make them feel at home and part of the tight knit boarding community.

We say goodbye to a number of staff from boarding this year but I know they will maintain a link with our community. Rick Balchin is stepping down as Housemaster and Assistant Director of Boarding. He will focus on the important role of Indigenous Education Manager. Brett Dickinson will no longer be Housemaster of McCann House but stays on at St Patrick's College as a teacher in the PE department.

Replacing Rick in Sturt House is Mike Silcock who brings with him a wealth of experience in boarding. He will be the Assistant Director of Boarding and also teaching English and History in the Junior school. He is joined by his wife Ainslie who will be teaching in the Food Technology department. Andrew Schuyler, Housemaster of Nangle, will be joining the teaching staff full-time next year which will enable him to have an even greater influence within the boarding community.

As ever, we are hugely indebted to our Housekeepers. They have done a fantastic job, sometimes in trying circumstances!

I decided to increase the hours and number of Housekeepers partway through the year, as I am only too aware of the important role they play in a boarding community. I, along with many others, feel this been to very good effect. The boys have been afforded even greater levels of care and it has been very noticeable in the appearance of the Houses. I would like to thank the maintenance team for all they have done throughout the year.

The Catering Team also deserves recognition and thanks for having worked hard all year to cater for the boys. Bernie and his team work tirelessly, often behind the scenes, always with the boys' well-being in mind. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our three GAP

students who contribute to the boarding community in a wide variety of ways.

The boarders have involved themselves in a wide variety of sporting and cultural activities throughout the year. The boarders' football team beat all before them under the guidance of Rick and Bernie. We had valuable contributions from a number of boys in the rugby teams while the basketball teams were dominated by a group of extremely talented boarders.

We had a dedicated group giving their time to tutoring at St Albans, which is such a worthy and valuable pursuit. Local football clubs benefitted from the talent and dedication of many in our community and the TAC Rebels were very well represented by St Patrick's boarders. We have made our weekly trips to Mass which has been a time to reflect on the week past and the week ahead and the way in which we conduct our lives. We have always been welcomed at St Columba's and the congregation held a coffee and cake evening after a recent Mass to say farewell to our leavers and wish all the boys luck with their exams.

In the last month an enormous amount of money has been spent on furniture in all the boarding houses. I felt a need for this and it was something that many of you also felt necessary, as was highlighted in the recent online surveys many of you completed. Each boarding house, from January 2013, will have fit-for-purpose beds with an under-bed locker on wheels, new residential quality wardrobes and new desks so that all boys have somewhere to study. The boys are slowly but surely beginning to get the message about locking valuable items away, although unfortunately there are still mobile phones, iPods and laptops left out during the day. Every boy has a secure area, i.e. a locker and a combination safe. Please reinforce the message at home that it is **their** responsibility to lock items up when they are out of the house.

Damage to property, personal items and thefts have been minimal this year, which is pleasing, but they do still happen on occasions. We know that damage is occasionally caused and it has been very encouraging that most of the time the culprits come forward and acknowledge it. Long may that continue! I will, once again, be reinforcing the need for all new and existing school property to be treated with respect.

As many of you are aware I implemented a number of changes to the boarding system throughout the year, a few of which have been met with a good degree of resentment. These are changes that I, and others, felt necessary and vital to the on-going safety and well-being of your boys here at St Patrick's College. Increased levels of supervision and a more proactive approach to 'boarding duty' is something I am continually pushing to instil in my boarding team. A programme of professional development for all boarding staff is planned for 2013 which will further enhance our team.

In an effort to build an even more cohesive community and increase the level and quality of pastoral care we are changing the boarding structure in the Houses from January 2013. From next year, Sturt House, our boarding house on the other side of Sturt Street, will become a weekly boarding house. It will shut on Friday afternoons and reopen on Sunday evenings.

This will result in the other three Houses being more highly populated over the weekends and therefore allowing a more vibrant atmosphere to exist for our full boarders.

One of the roles of our new Assistant Director of Boarding is to develop, with input from the boys, a weekend activities programme. I know from conversations with our current boarders that many just want to relax and do their own thing after a busy week but others want the opportunity to partake in organised activities. Go-karting, movies, bowling and fishing have proved popular this year so I am sure that all of these and more will be on offer to those interested in getting involved next year.

Dates for your diary and important information for 2013:

- Boarders return **Wednesday 30 January**. There will be a BBQ and drinks on the lawn outside McCann House from **2pm**. Please endeavour not to return your boys before this time as staff will be involved in other school commitments and the Houses may not be open. There will be an activity organised for all the boarders on the Wednesday night before lessons commence on the Thursday morning.

Weekly boarding

- To ensure equity and fairness for all families, any boys enrolled as weekly boarders who wish to stay at College over a weekend will be charged \$110 per weekend. We will be working on the premise that, from January 2013, all weekly boarders will go home on Friday afternoon unless arrangements have been made with the Director of Boarding in advance. Leave arrangements for full boarders choosing to go home or stay with friends at weekends need to be made with the Housemaster by the Thursday prior to the weekend. If you have any queries about your son's enrolment status a call to our Business Manager, Shirley Walters, should clarify your situation.

Housekeeping

- On a housekeeping note we would request that all boys arrive in January with a rigid rectangular plastic laundry basket. We recommend the type sold in Big W or K-Mart for around \$10. Please do not send your son back with a collapsible basket as it makes life very difficult for our Housekeepers when they are moving to and from the Laundry. Any boys returning without a laundry basket will have one purchased by us and the cost added to their bill.
- It is advisable that each boy brings two combination padlocks: one for his under-bed locker and one for his desk.

Exeat weekends

- Each year there are published Exeat weekends which provide a chance for boys and staff to take a break from school and recharge their batteries. I have listed them below so please make note of the dates as the boarding houses will be closed to all students on these weekends. With exams beginning in a little over one weeks time, all students should be busy summarising and revising their semester notes. Apart from regular distractions such as mobile phones, texting, television and Facebook, another common distraction involves that of negative self-talk.

Listed are a few ways to identify and deal with self-defeating self-talk.

Self-talk that Interferes with Studying

When confronted with the decision to study or not to study, you may engage in a little talk with yourself. In the list below you will find some of the statements people make to convince themselves not to study. These statements lead to the conclusion "I will not study now."

However, the statements are not always true, rational or realistic ways to describe your situation. By learning to identify self-defeating self-talk you may be able to talk to yourself in more helpful ways, thus leading to more self motivation, less procrastination, and better study attitudes. Some of the more common negative self-talk is listed below.

When you hear yourself talking or thinking these thoughts, recognize that you are giving yourself permission not to study. Although you may enjoy not studying at the moment, the long-range outcome is often one that you do not enjoy (for example, poor grades, cramming, or feeling guilty).

Check this list every day to see how many negative self-statements you are using. Try to eliminate as many as you can.

- I. I don't feel like studying...
 - I'm hungry...
 - I'm sleepy...
 - I'm bored...
 - I'm not in the mood to study...
- II. This material is too difficult..
 - This is too hard...
 - I don't have the background for this...
 - It's hopeless...
- III. I'll never need to know this...
 - This is stupid stuff to spend time on...
- IV. I don't need to study now...
 - I studied this yesterday (in the past)...
 - I can do it later...
 - I have plenty of time to do this...
 - If I study this now, I'll forget it by test time...
- V. This is too much material to cover...
 - I won't have time to finish anyway...
 - The teacher just expects too much...

- VI.** It doesn't make any difference whether I study or not...
 It's really no use to study...
 Studying doesn't help in this course...
- VII.** I don't like the teacher
 The teacher doesn't care...
- VIII.** I can't concentrate...
 My mind wanders too much...
 People distract me...
 I can't study here, (or any other place)...
- IX.** I can't study now; I'll miss...
 I'll miss things I want to do if I study now...
 I can't study *and* do things I want to...
 I have other things I need to do now...
 Things are happening that I'll miss if I study now...
 Nobody else is studying...
