

WELCOME TO THE FIRST EDITION OF THE SHAMROCK FOR 2005

This edition highlights some of the happenings at the College during a busy and successful first term. It has been a short, jam-packed term with events and student and old boy achievements. We competed at Nagambie in the annual Head of the Lake Regatta in February, just one week after a spectacular Legends Dinner featuring Cardinal George Pell, Raimond Gaita and Brian Brown.

The OCA also organised a successful Melbourne Dinner featuring guest speaker Danny Frawley which was well attended by old boys from many eras. Those in attendance at the dinner were testimony to the remarkable traditions of excellence forged by past students and inspired by gifted and dedicated teachers. This legacy, and the challenge inherent within it, was enthusiastically accepted by the Class of 2004 who achieved outstanding academic results whilst also providing many highlights in concert halls and on playing fields around the state. This edition of The Shamrock, featuring the OCAs Green, White and Blue, highlights this tradition of excellence at the College and recognises and celebrates the achievements of past students who have made a rich contribution to the story of St Pat's.

FROM THE HEADMASTER

The first term of 2005 commenced smoothly with more than 1,000 students enrolled including 200 Year 7s in eight classes of 25. Our two Boarding Houses, McCann and Nangle are full with 29 boarders in residence. Many students from Years 10, 11 & 12 last year have taken up pre-apprenticeship courses, apprenticeships, traineeships and TAFE Courses reflecting our inclusive enrolment and our preparation of these students for the world of work. At the same time the College was buoyed by the VCE results of our 130 graduates with the upward trend in study scores continuing.

The Dux of the College was Josh Kannourakis (99.15). 22 students had a tertiary study entrance score of 90 or better. This was reflected in students accessing the traditional courses of St Pat's scholars: Medicine and Law at the University of Melbourne with residence at Newman College. 44 students received first round offers to study locally at the University of Ballarat. Tom Andrews received a Premier's Award for top mark for Media with a study score of 50. Congratulations to students and staff on these outcomes.

Other notable features of the term included Year 12 student Andrew Carey's selection to represent Australia at the International Young Scientists Forum in London, the winning of the Head of the Lake Regatta, the winning of the Interschool Swimming for the 26th year in a row, the sad death of one of our Year 10 students, Marcus King (RIP), the induction of Cardinal George Pell as a Legend of the College along with philosopher and author Raimond Gaita and sportsman Brian Brown, the investiture of Lt Colonel Les Coleman (SPC 1931-36) in the Legion of Honour by the French Ambassador, the returns of Archbishop Sir Frank Little and Cardinal George Pell to the College, and the continuing development of future structures within Edmund Rice and Christian Brothers circles. The Shamrock will pick up on many of these.

In all we have started the year as we intend to continue: enthusiastically and successfully, reflectively and respectfully, 'growing in wisdom and stature in the eyes of the Lord'.

The Little Family Connection

Archbishop Sir Frank Little, in the company of many family members, blessed the Little Wing. It was good to have him and his brother Gerald back with us after a long break. Their brother Jack died last year in Brisbane. The Archbishop gave two addresses, one centring on the friendships he made at

St Patrick's College that last to this day, the other focusing on the academic pursuits for which this place has been famous. He detailed the incredible influence of the College on his four uncles and his father and their subsequent professional lives, starting with the winning of two Military Crosses in the first World War. Our students listened attentively and respectfully to his words and many enjoyed the opportunity to speak with him as the current custodians of the spirit of SPC.

I introduced the Archbishop to the Academic assembly with the following words:

'It is good to come back to our legends and reflect on the men and boys who have built the spirit of St Patrick's College, the fighting spirit of O'Malley and the learning of Purton, the tenacity of Kelty and the service of Zoch. Today we welcome back another Dux of the College, His Grace Archbishop Sir Frank Little. He was Captain and Dux of the College in 1942 before entering the seminary.'

'The Little Family Award is one of our two premier student awards and is given for contribution to school spirit, a hallmark of the Little Family at St Patrick's College since 1904 when the first of the Archbishop's family started here. His brother Gerald (SPC 1937-40) joins us today, his cousin John son of Leo (SPC1906-10) and they in turn have their sons here.'

'His Grace, Sir Frank, obtained a Doctorate in Sacred Theology at the

Urban University in Rome and has served as priest, bishop and archbishop in the Archdiocese of Melbourne. His loves include regular meetings with his St Pat's Old Collegian friends and supporting the Essendon Football Club of which he was the Number One Ticket Holder for many years, supplanted by the Treasurer Mr Peter Costello. In his life he has managed to balance academic success, sporting prowess, spiritual fervour and leadership while maintaining a sense of humour and good relationships. In my personal reflections preparing for today I have had the joy of looking at His Grace as a young man in class photos, roll call photos, college activities and sports teams. In all of them he is clearly recognisable as the same person. But who would have pictured the life that has evolved for him when he was sitting as a student with his peers just as you are now. Yet I put it to you that he has lived in the realm of possibility. He has reflected on life's offerings and said yes to opportunity. He has chosen to fly with his face to the sun rather than be contained by looking over the precipice. He is an exemplar of St Patrick's College's pillars of faith, tradition, excellence and joy.'

'Please make him welcome to his educational home and follow his lead of dwelling in possibility. From Year 7 to Year 12, who can contain what you might become?'

Evolution or revolution for Edmund Rice schools?

The end of Term One saw all SPC staff engaged in professional learning and personal development activities. The last two days were spent with Professor Denis McLaughlin who is researching the life and spirit of Blessed Edmund Rice on behalf of the Christian Brothers in Australia. Both Professor McLaughlin's research and our staff in-servicing are facets of a national and international process with the Congregation of Christian Brothers, the Edmund Rice Network and the Edmund Rice Schools, preparing for a future which will potentially see no Christian Brothers in Australia.

The reorganisation process aims to be complete in 2008. Elements of the preparation include meetings of the Board Chairs of the 38 Edmund Rice schools in Australia owned by the Congregation, consultations with the Association of Heads of Edmund Rice Schools of Australia, a national gathering of all Christian Brothers in Australia, and the strengthening of ties between the schools including the annual conference of the College Captains which SPC will host in 2007.

From a school perspective, the exercise is aimed at ensuring that the work of Edmund Rice in education will be able to continue and remain distinctively true to his guiding spirit. To this end, the Charter of Edmund Rice Schools of Australia has been adopted by the 38 schools. It

outlines 11 cultural characteristics of any school which would see itself as following in Edmund's footsteps: holistic education, spirituality, faith in action, community, pastoral care, service of others, being just, at the margins, compassion, stewardship, and reflective practice. These elements have been part of the staff workshoping at our residential inservice for each of the last three years. The Charter will be a major contributor to our Strategic Plan 2006-2010 which is currently being prepared by the College Board.

The Superior General of the Congregation, Br Philip Pinto, is challenging all to renew the relevance of their lives to the spirit of the Founder and their calling to serve. For many this is unwelcome news as it calls for radical re-examination of priorities at personal and institutional level. Br Pinto speaks of the need for followers of Edmund to be subversive in society, challenging its standards and expectations. For us, maintaining our social mix, our accessibility to the least advantaged of society, our educational attractiveness to the most wealthy, our spirit of open-hearted welcome, and our acceptance of our boys for who they are, will make a great start as an Edmund Rice school.



Ian Lillico, well-known advocate of boys' education visited on March 30 as part of the College's Staff Professional Development Week. During the day, Ian worked with staff, looking at how boys learn and what implications this has for our teaching. In the evening, he conducted a parents' forum attended by over 180 people. Ian was an entertaining, insightful and challenging presenter and all who attended his session benefited greatly from his experience and expertise.

Ian is recognised as a leader in the field of boys' education worldwide and provides seminars and professional development

to teachers, parents, parenting and sporting groups and all kinds of organisations throughout Australia and overseas. He was awarded a Churchill Fellowship for the year 2000 to further research boys' education in Europe, the United Kingdom and North America.

In 2003 Ian became a Fellow of the Australian Council of Education Leaders and, in 2004 became a National Fellow of the Australian Council of Education Leaders. The College recognises that the education of boys is a specialist area and is committed to enhancing best practice teaching and learning outcomes for boys and their families.



The team was magnificently led by Captain Jeremy Wirges and Vice-Captains Sam Caldwell and Jarrod King and the other senior swimmers who gained 108 points out of possible 112 and provided a fine example to the rest of the

team. Particular highlights were the individual winning swims by Jeremy Wirges, Leigh Weber, Jarrod King and their Open relay win, where they were joined by Sam Caldwell; the new record set by Will Van Keulen, Charlie Kitchin, Jordan Kissane and Simon Ward in the Open Division Two relay; the fighting win by Luke Wirges in the U/16 100m freestyle; and the effort of the Under 13 team of Dylan Rodger, Jake Clark-Ballis, Justin King and Dylan Prozzo in scoring 101 out of a possible 104 points. 

PAUL PARDOEL (SPC 1982-87)

Flight Lieutenant Paul Pardoel became the first Australian killed in the current conflict in Iraq. Paul was a popular student from Clunes who was involved in a wide variety of activities during his time at St Pat's including rugby and public speaking. Tributes to Paul were made from the Prime Minister down and were featured in national, state and local media. Perhaps the most salient tribute came from friend Phil Crain (SPC 1982-87) who wrote:

'I just can't find the words to pay a decent enough tribute to our great friend 'Pards'. He was one of a kind. He wasn't just bright, he was brilliant. He wasn't just funny, he was hilarious. And it was always an adventure to be in his company.'

He always appreciated the value of the education he received at St Pat's, and he had a great regard for the Brothers, teachers and his mates at the College. When he joined the RAAF, he had the gift of making the tough times fun, something for which his classmates will always remember him. He was just great to be around.

This tragic event has taken away one of the most original people I've ever known. Our loss is mitigated only by the fact that his spirit will live on in his three beautiful

children. Our thoughts are with them and his lovely wife, Kellie.'

In response to Phil's wonderful words and the tireless efforts of College Archivist Br Brian Davis, who was also Paul's House Master in 1987, and spoke to all sections of the media at the family's request, Adrian Pekin (SPC 1986-89) wrote:

'Thank you Br Davis for the fantastic portrayal of Paul's life on the 7.30 Show. You have remembered him as I have, a strong and courageous man who achieved his goals in life. I am proud to have known Paul as part of the SPC community and was proud to have been a St Patrick's College student after last night's program.'

The St Patrick's College community will celebrate the life of Paul at its ANZAC Day service on April 22, 2005.

FOUNDATION 'HALLS OF HISTORY – DINNER WITH THE LEGENDS' 2005.

The fourth annual Foundation 'Halls of History - Dinner with the Legends' was held in the Old Assembly Hall at the College on Saturday February 19, 2005. Over 190 people were in attendance and sat riveted during the induction of College Legends George Cardinal Pell (SPC 1949-59), Raimond Gaita (SPC 1958-62) and Brian Brown (SPC 1970-75). MC Gerard FitzGerald (SPC 1973) did a wonderful job in keeping the night on track.

Cardinal Pell delivered the key note address and was inspirational, entertaining and enlightening, providing some insights into the process that will be used to select the next Pope. During his hour at the lectern it would have been possible to hear a pin drop, such was the power of his delivery and the personal rapport he quickly established with everybody in the room.

Raimond Gaita provided much for everybody to think about, particularly our current Student Council who were in attendance on the night. He talked of the sanctity and respect for the dignity of the individual and instanced it from occasions in his own life and in the Nazi concentration camps. Raimond was the Foundation Professor of Philosophy at Australian Catholic University and Professor of Moral Philosophy at King's College, University of London. He has been a prolific writer releasing a number

of highly acclaimed books including, An Absolute Conception, Romulus My Father, A Common Humanity and The Philosopher's Dog. We now have lots of folk scurrying to read his autobiographical, 'Romulus, My Father'!

Brian Brown perhaps had the most difficult job – following the Cardinal! He spoke passionately about his time as a Boarder at St Pat's and of his ongoing involvement in Catholic education. Brian was Captain of St Patrick's College in 1975. He was Captain of both the 1st XVIII and 1st XI and was recruited by Fitzroy whilst at the College. He went on to play 51 games with Fitzroy and 2 games with Essendon before his career was cut short by knee injuries. With prompting he also briefly mentioned his son Jonathon – a useful footballer up north we are told!

Prior to his visit he announced that the French Government would bestow its highest military honour, the Legion of Honour Award to six Australian World War 2 veterans. A ceremony was held on February 22 where awards were presented to five of the six veterans. Due to ill health Les Coleman could not attend the ceremony.


Les was a Captain in the Australian Army and was sent to Europe as an observer – as was noted, he did far more than observe! On June 6, 1944 he went ashore in Normandy and was wounded weeks later in Villers-Bocage when his armoured vehicle was sprayed by schrapnel by a German tank. He was taken to London to recover from these wounds but quickly returned to duty seeing action in France and Belgium.

To accommodate Les' health issues, the French Ambassador to Australia His Excellency Mr Patrick Henault travelled to Les' Nursing Home in Point Lonsdale on

Wednesday March 30 to personally present Les with his medal. The ceremony was attended by the Headmaster, Dr Peter Casey and College Captain, Michael Huckstepp. The ceremony was also attended by members of Les' family and other veterans from his era. Les is justifiably proud of his medal and we wish him the best of health over the years ahead.

The event was covered in both The Age and Herald-Sun newspapers, with Les referred to as 'The Little Napoleon' by French soldiers.

AUSTRALIA DAY HONOURS Mr Geoff Torney OAM (SPC 1946 – 1952)

From the College Archivist, Br Brian Davis Commitment to principle and involvement in the community are two traits that are evident in the life of Geoff Torney; from his student days right up to the present time. In his final year he was a member of the Holy Name Society and of Our Lady's Sodality. He played a good game of golf and was Captain of the College 2nd XI cricket team and of Galvin House in the Senior Oval competition.

In 1952 Geoff won the Purton Oratory with a speech entitled "How Strong is the British Commonwealth?". There were twenty four Matriculation student entries, necessitating elimination heats to reduce the field to eight contestants for the final, which took place on Sunday September 21 in the College Hall. Dr Frank McArdle was Adjudicator and Br J.D.Healy acted as Chairman. Geoff's winning speech is printed in full in the 1952 College Annual magazine.

It is a source of great pride for Geoff and his wife Janet, that his second son Matthew won the Purton Oratory in 1992. Geoff Torney crowned his seven years of education at St Patrick's College by being appointed a Prefect in 1952. He was an excellent student, evidenced by the fact that he won a Commonwealth Scholarship.

After completing his law degree at the University of Melbourne he returned to Ballarat and joined the prominent law firm, Byrne, Jones and Torney, now known as BJT Legal.

The recognition by his peers of his expertise and wisdom in his chosen profession as a specialist solicitor in litigation is underlined by his appointments as one of two solicitors on the original Legal Practice Board and as a Council Member of the Law Institute of Victoria for three years. This led to important and responsible appointments in the business sector as Foundation Director with the Victorian Securities Corporation and as a member of the appellate body of the Australian Securities and Investments Commission.

Indeed foundation becomes a key word in Geoff's community involvement as he served as a Founding member of the Board of Aquinas College, Ballarat, later to become a campus of Australian Catholic University and remains a member of the ACU company; Founding Chair of Ballarat Regional Industries; Founding Chair of the Ballarat Special School Council, and has served as Foundation Chair of The Courier Charity Fund since 2001.

It was inevitable that Geoff's love of racing would result in a formal role in the racing industry. He started doing legal work for the Ballarat Turf Club in 1966 and remained a Committee Member, serving two terms as President, until 1988, when he joined the Moonee Valley Racing Club Committee, serving as Chairman from 1997 to 2002. During this time he served as Chairman of the Victorian Country Racing Council and founding director of Racing Victoria Limited.

Geoff's great life involvements with the Church, St Patrick's College, the legal fraternity, business and racing have been matched by the great love and pride that Geoff and Janet have in their family. Anthony (SPC 1976 – 1981), after studying law, is involved with Centro Property Investments while Matthew (SPC 1978 – 1992), after studies in London, is a member of the Strategic Planning branch of the ANZ Bank.

Geoff continues to support the College as a committee member for the OCA Pavilion Appeal Project and hence it should come as no surprise that Geoff Torney was honoured in the 2005 Australia Day Honours with appointment as a Member in the General Division of the Order of Australia (AM). On behalf of the St Pat's community and Ballarat, thank you and congratulations Geoff!

Another SPC Old Boy was also recognised in the Australia Day Honours List. John Ryan (SPC 1939-42) also received an OAM for service to the community and his expertise within the building industry. John is a contemporary of Archbishop Sir Frank Little and has been a great friend and professional adviser to him assisting with a number of major building projects in the Melbourne Archdiocese.

- Fr Laurie Bissett, MSC (SPC 1950-52) has been a Priest in Queensland for several years and has recently commenced caring for his sick brother. He lives in Murrumba Downs and has previously been Chaplain at the Princess Alexandra Hospital in Brisbane.

In 1950 John stood for the State seat of Ballarat against T.T. Holloway, the incumbent Premier of the State. Although he lost the 1950 election, he recorded a substantial swing and when in 1952 Holloway transferred to the seat of Glen Iris, John Sheehan was elected in 1952. His oratory skills were highly recognised in Parliament and he served diligently as Minister for Housing, working closely on the 1956 Olympics Housing Project. After being defeated in 1955 he returned to education and was Principal of Ballarat High School from 1972-75. He then worked as an educational consultant until the time of his death in 1984. John's link to the College continued with sons Robert, Mark and Damien attending St Pat's and his grandson James Cook is a current Year 7 student.
- We also heard from another politician Gavan O'Connor, MP (SPC 1965) who was re-elected as the Member for Corio. He was first elected in 1993 following the retirement of Gordon Scholes. He has held numerous positions including Shadow Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries.
